These estimates do not include carcinoma in situ (non-invasive cancer) of any site except <u>urinary bladder</u>⁵, nor do they include <u>basal cell or squamous cell skin cancers</u>⁶.

- 18% of cancer survivors were diagnosed 20 or more years ago.
- About two-thirds (67%) of cancer survivors are 65 years of age or older.
